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WATER TRIBUNAL FINDS MINING COMPANY GUILTY OF WATER CONTAMINATION

Yesterday, the Latin American Water Tribunal (LAWT) found the Montana Exploradora Company (a subsidiary of Goldcorp) guilty of causing harm to the environment and to the people of San Miguel Ixtahuacán and Sipacapa, San Marcos. The verdict was rejected by the National Mining Association of Guatemala.

In a week of public hearings, in Antigua, Guatemala, Sacatepéquez, the LAWT heard 10 cases concerning water contamination and water depletion on the Latin American continent. Last night, the Tribunal announced its verdicts on these cases. The Jury was made up of 10 members from different countries, amongst whom were Alexandre Camanho, former Attorney General of Brazil, Philippe Texier, a former French judge, David Barkin, a Mexican academic, as well as two members from Guatemala - Augusto Willemsen, former Assistant Procurer of Human Rights and Dr. José Barnoya.

DENOUNCEMENT OF DAMAGES

The petition examined by the Tribunal was submitted by the Municipality of Socapa, the community of Tres Cruces and the Sipakapense Mayan community. They accused the Marlin Mine (property of Montana) of affecting 10,000 inhabitants by causing wells to dry up and by detonating explosions to make wells inside the mine, all of which have caused harm to homes and to communities in the area.

The Tribunal concluded that it is highly possible that the slag heap in the mine is discharging acidic water and that there is risk of spills that could cause serious harm to the communities located near the Cuilco River and Tzalá river basins and to aquatic species in those rivers.

The LAWT holds Montana responsible for damage to the environment and recommended that the company provide financial compensation to the communities of San Miguel Ixtahuacán and Sipacapa. The Tribunal also recommended that independent studies be carried out to ensure that affected communities are allowed to participate in the investigation into the mine's capacity to operate without causing damage to the community and the surrounding area.

The LAWT holds the Government of Guatemala responsible for failing to deal with damages caused by these high-risk mining operations. The Jury also criticized the Government for not applying ILO 169 and for not acknowledging the popular referendums conducted by the petitioning communities. The Tribunal recommended that Congress introduce reforms to the Mining Law, in the interest of protecting national sovereignty and defending the rights and the legacy of Guatemalans.
